Money Station WGRO

Construction has begun on radio station WGRC, a 10-watt brainchild of the Greece Central School District's Redesign Council. Despite the approval by the FCC for construction and the walls being erected at Athena High School, the station still has some major hurdles to overcome. The major hurdle is

Donn Wilshaw, Redesign Co-ordinator and students Valerie Low, station finance chairman and James Paris, general man-ager addressed the Greece Council of the Rochester Cham-

Wilshaw told the local businessmen that the station, which expects to be on the air next spring, will address itself to the communication problem and the lack of community identity evident in the Town of Greece. "It is not a toy for students to play with," he stated. "It is serious business."

The station plans to present educational programs, call-in shows, opinion programs, musical productions, sports presentations and debates. Also included in plans and programs from the Strasenburg Planetarium and presentations by the Greece Police Department, Fire

Center and other organizations.
"There will be something for everyone," Paris noted.

WGRC, when in operation, will have a 20-mile radius, sufficient power to cover all of the Town of Greece. It will represent the culmination of countless hours of work, by not only students and faculty members, but hard work and donations from hundreds of interested residents throughout the town from all walks. It is a product of the Redesign program.

The first thought of such a program was the result of the Redesign Council. A feasibility studies was made, after which the Greece Central School Board gave its unanimous approval. The first application for a construction permit from the FCC was rejected. Only after reworking the plans and specifications did the FCC grant its approval. A broadcast license will still be needed after completion. The second victory for the proposed station was a \$2,000 "mini-grant" from the federal government.

The balance of the \$11,000 needed for its construction will have to come from the local community. Several thousands of dollars have already been

raised by students conducting door-to-door solicitations, fund-raising events, such as dances, and the sale of "stock." This past weekend, the students have been delivering telephone books to help raise the needed funds. Miss Low, daughter of the chairman of the Station Advisory Committee, reported to

the Chamber that the program was still some \$6,000 short of their goal.

Operating at 90.1 on the FM dial, the station personnel hope to increase the power of the station to 1,300 watts in the future. By increasing the station power, the program could be eligible for aid from the federal gov-

ernment,
WGRC intends to broadcast
from their Athena studios from
10:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m. Monday through Friday.
