





WGMC: Dream Rearing Reality

The construction of WGMC-FM, Greece's first educational radio station began Tuesday, October 10 in Athena's Commons Area when Jim Paris, Station general manager; Mr. David Robinson, superintendent of schools; and Mr. Hunter Low, chairman of the FM citizens' advisory council layed the first brick.

The "carpet-breaking" ceremony was attended by about 50 people and received coverage from two local television stations.

Paris, a senior at Arcadia High School, said that the dream of a radio station in Greece is becoming more and more of a reality as the station progresses towards its first broadcast.

Mr. Low said that a great

deal of work has been put into the station and the people who have worked on it should be proud of their work.

Superintendent Robinson said that credit was due to the more than 200 students and adults who have worked to bring the station into its newest phase--that of actual construction.

The ten watt station will be constructed in the eastern half of the Commons Area. It will cover 1,500 square feet, and broadcast at 90.1 megacycles.

The operation of the station is in conjunction with the Redesign program. The station will be operated by community students and adults.

Federal funds totaling \$1,951 in the form of a Title III

Mini Grant have been given to the station. Funds for innovative programs are supplied through the Title III of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act.

Station personnel are hopeful that WGMC will begin broadcasting in early January, 1973.
